Academy Courses Offer New Opportunities

This year a different learning alternative has been offered to junior and senior students at Dell Rapids High School. The Career and Technical Education Academy located in Sioux Falls has opened up for the 2010-2011 school year, and 20 DRHS students are taking advantage of this great opportunity.

Last year the sophomores and juniors were asked if they wanted this opportunity and the seven juniors and 12 seniors have taken a block of time out of each school day to travel to Sioux Falls to attend their unique class of choice.

There are approximately 750 students taking classes at the Academy. Although most of the students are from Sioux Falls, others come from the surrounding area. Currently there are 11 schools participating in the career academy.

Transportation to the Academy is mostly student responsibility as most of the classes are at different times of the day. The students whose classes are in the morning either drive themselves or carpool, but the afternoon students have the choice of riding a bus.

Many different types of classes are available at the Academy which consist of hands-on and special training in an assortment of career areas. Whether you want to attend an introductory level class or an advanced one, the Academy offers it all. A few of the classes offered to DRHS students include: Media Production I, Health Careers I, Carpentry I, and Culinary and Restaurant Management I. Each of the classes keep students thinking as they work on different projects and advance their knowledge of the career area. In fact, the mission of the Academy is "to educate and prepare each student to succeed in a changing world".

Junior April Erdman's new Health Careers I class is different from other classes she has taken. In this class she is exploring more about health careers by doing a lot of hands-on work. "It's awesome," she said. Erdman's class starts at 7:30 a.m. and is about two hours long, so she returns to the school around 9:50 a.m. every day, which works out great with her schedule. Erdman also plans on attending Health Careers II second semester.

Senior Anthony Cameron attends a Culinary Arts and Business Management class. "It is my favorite class," Cameron said. His class is in the afternoon at 1:10 p.m. and he doesn't return to DRHS as he is done for the day.

The new Career Academy has given some DRHS students the ability to learn more about specific careers they wouldn't have been able to at DRHS. "I think the career academy provides a great opportunity for students to take career classes we don't exactly have here," Principal Bruce Olson said.

With this opportunity at hand, Dell Rapids students can continue to enjoy the experience of the career academy and be even more prepared to enter the world that awaits them.

AG IN ACTION

The high school agriculture classes have new names and some new things being offered this year. This change came about as changes have occurred at the state level with standards being implemented in agriculture education.

The Fundamental Ag Mechanics class comprised of junior and senior students has finished a unit on hydraulics and now they are in the shop applying the hydraulic concepts in constructing a hydraulic tubing bender. Following the completion of the tubing bender, the students will return to the classroom to go over the unit on plumbing. They will be exposed to the various plumbing materials, plumbing tools used and some of the applied skills. They will have the opportunity to return to the shop and try soldering copper pipe as well as gluing PVC pipe. On September 2nd, Jeff Vavra, the admissions representative from WyoTech school presented information about their school to the students. The South Dakota State University College of Agriculture and Biological Sciences has ambassadors that visit schools to inform students of opportunities available. Brianna Sandager, a senior Animal Science/Pre Vet student and Emily Schwaller, a junior Animal Science major with agronomy and ag business minors, were the two agriculture ambassadors to visit this class on September 10 to present their information. Exposing students to the various post-secondary options is always great especially for junior and senior students.

The unit on FFA has been the main focus for the Introduction to Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources students. This class of freshmen students has been covering the history, opportunities and skills students can develop by joining the FFA organization. Students have the choice to pay the \$15 dues and join this great organization. Shop safety, tool identification, project design and construction of a small wood project are the next items to be covered. This class had a guest presenter on August 31st. Mary Lou Lacey from the USDA Natural Resource Conservation Service office in Minnehaha County presented information to the students on what the NRCS office does, her job requirements as a soil conservationist and what type of education is needed for jobs with the NRCS.

The classroom instruction has concluded for the Ag Power Technology students and now they will start in the shop working on engine projects. Those projects range from complete overhauls to just general maintenance and a tune-up. This class is only a nine-week long course, so it will end on Oct. 20. The course of Ag Metal Fabrication will be offered during the same period during the second nine weeks. Jeff Vavra, from the WyoTech school, also presented his information about their schools to these students on September 2nd.

Nick Siemonsma exhibited two market hogs in the FFA division at the Sioux Empire Fair. Four FFA officers attended the Dakotafest Farm Show on August 18 to view the over 500 local and leading companies related to agriculture. Those exhibitors and manufacturers presented the latest technological advancements in agriculture. Those attending were Nick Siemonsma, John Elverson, Colin LeBrun and Trevor Peter. Caleb Buysse exhibited a breeding ewe at the South Dakota State Fair in the FFA division on September 5th. The district land judging school held near Chester on September 23rd had 20 agriculture students and FFA members developing skills in land evaluation. Two state FFA officers visited the morning agriculture classes on September 27th to encourage students to get involved in the dynamic organization for student interested in agriculture. The South East Region Land Judging event was held on September 28th near Brandon. The FFA chapter will have an entry for the homecoming parade on October 1st. Two members will have the opportunity to attend the National FFA Convention in Indianapolis, IN on October 20-23. The members will once again be starting the annual fruit sale in mid-October, so keep an eye out for members selling and advertisements relating to this fundraiser. Members are also working on developing their leadership skills to compete in the leadership career development events on November 4th in Brookings and the district event on November 15th in Hartford.


