KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION EXTENDED UNTIL FEB-11

Parents MUST REGISTER their kindergarteners for next school year by February 11. In December there were 15 registrations and now there are 54. We usually expect about 60 to 70 students in kindergarten. Please encourage your neighbors to register. By extending the deadline, we expect to get every potential kindergartener registered. It is important to register even if you may not send your child. The school district parent-teacher task force is considering all day every day programming and may even consider a kindergarten readiness program for less mature kindergarten age students. However, we need to know enrollment numbers before final recommendations are made. Those still not registered can either call the elementary school at 428-3192 or send an email to Heidi.Adams@k12.sd.us so your child can be scheduled for kindergarten screening. You may also register online by clicking the top banner on the district web page (www.dr-k12.org)

If your child will be five on or before September 1, 2011, you should contact the school. Kindergarten registration is designed to assist parents who are unsure of whether their child should enter kindergarten even though they are of age as well as for parents sending their child to kindergarten. It is very important to participate in this registration to insure there are proper student/teacher ratios and enough materials for your child. Parents will be contacted by letter as to the time for their child's screening. If your child will be of kindergarten age, or you know of children who are, please help the school extend this list.

A ripe tangelo should be heavy for size, soft and have smooth skin. Most tangelos come from Florida and have a growing season from November through February.

SCHOOL BUS

At Dell Rapids High School, with the help of block scheduling, seniors are given the option of graduating early if all of the necessary requirements are met. This year, six seniors chose this option and are now moving on with their post-high school plans.

In order to graduate early, students had to turn in a request to the administration and make sure their schedules were arranged in a way that would include all of the graduation requirements; meaning at times, their schedules are pretty heavy. By choosing to graduate early, these students will miss out on high school events occurring during the second semester including prom and winter activities; however, these six former students though through the options and decided that graduating early was their best choice.

Brittni Steineke, one of the graduates, said, "I decided to graduate early because I felt I was ready for a new challenge, and ready to make the next step in my life." She took a fuller schedule in high school to achieve the 24 credits needed to graduate, and was definitely pleased with her decision. Graduating early has given her the opportunity to begin college in advance, and she has already started taking classes at the University of South Dakota (USD), and plans on majoring in sociology and nursing. SAMANTHA MATHIS' FEATURED JOURNALIST ARTICLE

When tragedy strikes we always point fingers, but are you pointing them in the right direction? Media is often put to blame but when it comes to a situation such as the Tuscon, A.Z., shooting; can you blame the media? Yes, there was a person pulling the trigger but was he in the right mindset when he saw the crosshairs as targets?

Journalists today often hide behind the First Amendment which prohibits the making of any law respecting an establishment of infringing on freedom of speech, freedom of press, and interfering with the right to peaceably assemble or prohibit petitioning for a government redress of grievances. I know journalists do have the right to say whatever they would like, but isn't it hard to know what is printed may be partially responsible if something happened to the subject within the printed material.

I do think it's okay to say what you believe and feel is right, but there are boundary lines that also should be observed. For instance, Jared Lee Loughner, the Tuscon gunman, is now getting so much media attention for the crime he committed. Others see this as an opportunity for attention and they could just as likely do the same thing. Of course, it is hard to avoid such media for it was a violent act and very much newsworthy at the time.

Sometimes the media only seems to show the violent things that happen, but what about the good in society? Always showing violence teaches us that it is an everyday occurrence and perhaps it is okay to commit these crimes. Always stating your opinion or showing violent images or things may help you feel better but it may cause someone else some suffering. We can't avoid the violence that occurs throughout our world but the media could certainly do our part in helping it stop.

AG IN ACTION

On January 20th, twenty-three agriculture students attended the Student Career Day during the Ag Expo 2011. These individuals had the opportunity to view exhibits and equipment relating to agronomy and listen to Walter Bond, a former NBA athlete, presentation on personal accountability "No One Can Stop You BUT You!" The students then attended a luncheon with information presented by the luncheon sponsors. A tour of Raven Industry located downtown Sioux Falls concluded the events of the day.

The Wildlife and Fisheries class has finished up the introduction to wildlife, habitat, hunting and management. Andy Gabbert, a Habitat Biologist for South Dakota Game, Fish and Parks was a guest presenter on January 27. He discussed what he does as a habitat biologist and also exposed the students to the various careers in the wildlife field and what education is required to hold those positions. The students are now working on wildlife identification. They will be working on large mammals, small mammals, non-indigenous species, upland game birds, duck, geese, swans and cranes. They will investigate the general description, the habitat, feeding habits and life cycle of the various species.

Various shop projects occupy the class period for the Advanced Ag Mechanics students. Snow blower repair was a high demand area for the students. They are now working on repairing a horse trailer and building a snowmobile stand.

The Fundamental Animal Science students are just finishing up a unit on livestock selection. The students have gained knowledge about what to look for when selecting an animal, the various body parts that are indicators of a quality animal and other factors taken into consideration when selecting an animal. The next unit on genetics will expose the students to traits that are passed from the parent to the offspring and using a Punnett Square to help predict the gene combinations. On January 19th, Dr. Seth Severtson came into the class and presented information on horse hoof care and demonstrated how to properly trim and shoe a horse.

The FFA chapter will sponsor a 3-point shot event on February 12th to help raise funds for the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. Cystic Fibrosis is a genetic lung disease that causes the body to produce abnormally thick, sticky mucus, which clogs the lungs, leading to infections, and also obstructs the pancreas, inhibiting proper digestion of food. Progress in Cystic Fibrosis research has accelerated over the past few years and with the help of events like the 3-point shot contest, we can keep the Foundation on the forefront of medical science helping the 30,000 children and young adults who face cystic fibrosis every day. The FFA chapter will match the amount brought in on February 12th. The Corduroy Classic is scheduled to be held Saturday, Feb. 12. This event includes a pre-game reception for FFA members and half-time festivities. It will be a night of great basketball and an opportunity to celebrate the special connection SDSU shares with the FFA. The SDSU women's and men's basketball teams take on Western Illinois at Frost Arena in Brookings. The FFA members are starting to prepare for the spring career development events. Those events areas include: Ag Business Management, Ag Mechanics, Ag Sales, Agronomy, Dairy Cattle Evaluation, Dairy Foods, Floriculture, Food Science, Horse Evaluation, Livestock Evaluation, Meats Evaluation, Natural Resources, Nursery/Landscape and Range Plant Identification. The first event will be on March 2 at Howard. Members are also busy planning and preparing activities for the National FFA Week February 19 - 26.
