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The 'Principle' Corner - A monthly report on school changes and academic updates by Principal Kimberly Kludt

We are only a few weeks into the second semester, yet it is now time for students to begin the process of planning their coursework for the 2012-2013 school year. I would like to share with you a bit of an explanation of how this process will work.

One of the first things that happens every year is for all eighth grade students to explore the plans they have for life outside of high school. All eighth grade students across the state complete this process using an online tool called SDMyLife (http://www.sdmylife.com/). This website, provided by the South Dakota Department of Education, offers career exploration resources organized into sixteen broad career fields called clusters (listed in the course description booklet found on the DRHS website). Within each cluster, students find information about possible careers, earning potential, and required education and training. SDMyLife leads students through the process of creating a Personal Learning Plan which serves as a map to his/her high school career. The plan is developed based on a student's unique skills and interests, and it identifies specific coursework a student will need to take to reach both academic and career goals. SDMyLife also provides a portfolio for students to visit to update skills and interests; record completed coursework, extra-curricular activities, work experience, school projects; and research additional career fields. At a minimum, students will revisit this site yearly to make changes and revisions. It is a wonderful research and organizational tool for our students and their parents which can be accessed any time during and after their high school career. After students complete the SDMyLife Personal Learning Plan, they begin examining our DRHS Course Description Booklet and other possible coursework (CTE Academy courses / dual credit courses / DDN courses / Advanced Placement (AP) courses).

Students meet and work with Ms. Ruesink to create a plan for their 2012-2013 schedule that is both academically challenging and a good fit for their personal interests. Below is the schedule we will follow:

- February 2 Meet with students in grades 10-11 to discuss CTE Academy course offerings
- February 6 or 7 Tour of CTE Academy for students interested in CTE courses
- February 10 CTE course registration due to Ms. Ruesink
- February 16 Meet with students in grades 9-11 to discuss DRHS course offerings
- February 21 Meet with students in grade 8 to discuss DRHS course offerings. Students will individually take SD MyLife interest survey and create a Personal Learning Plan prior to this meeting.
- February 27 8th Grade Parents Informational Night... 7:00 in the High School Gym. We will discuss the DRHS course offerings and a variety of other topics pertinent to developing a comprehensive four year plan of study at DRHS.
- February 28 Registration for students in grade 11 and grade 10
- February 29 Registration for students in grade 9
- March 2 Registration for students in grade 8

School Board Election 2012


Two school board positions will be up for election on April 10, 2012. The two three-year positions, with duties to be assumed on July 9, 2012, will be vacant due to the expiration of the present terms of Brian Davis and Troy Randall.

Nominating petitions, along with information on how to circulate a petition, are available in the school district business office at 1216 N. Garfield Avenue. Petitions may be picked up and circulated between January 27-February 24, and must be filed with the business manager no later than February 24, 2012 at 5:00 p.m. To vote in this election, residents of the school district must be registered by March 26, 2012.

Serving as a school board member is a challenging job that requires leadership, vision, and dedication. It is one of the most important responsibilities a citizen can undertake. School board members shape the future of the community and society by establishing educational goals that help students reach high levels of achievement. Some of the most important duties of the school board are to advocate on behalf of all students, policy-making, hiring and evaluating the superintendent, planning and goal setting, maintaining fiscal responsibility, and providing safe, secure school facilities.

To be eligible to serve on a South Dakota school board, one must be at least 18 years old, a resident of the school district, and an eligible voter of the school district.

Six SD Schools Serve Organic Beef from Ben Cook Family Farm

Ben Cook Farms has been featured on National Public Radio for their commitment to organic farming, and was named Minnesota Family Farm of the year in 2009 by the University of Minnesota.

Purchasing Cook Family Farm beef was arranged by Lunchtime Solutions Regional Manager Tam Edgar, whose family also farms near Adrian, Minnesota. Big Improvements at DRHS

As most of you have probably heard, big changes are being made at Dell Rapids High School. There have been many improvements to the school, one being an additional gym with additions for the weight room and wrestling rooms. For Quarrier athletes, coaches, and fans, the new gym is an exciting addition and everyone is eager to see it put to good use. The gym is located at the north end of the school, making it easily accessible form the high school and the middle school. Bleachers have been installed on the west side of the gym and can hold up to about 400 spectators. After replacing the scoreboards in the main gym, the old scoreboards were hung in the new gym.

The gym will be very convenient for practices, games and tournaments of all kinds. In addition to these benefits, the gym will also serve as a classroom. Prior to the addition, there was not enough space for both middle and high school students to receive the amount of physical education they are required to have. The middle school students were having gym class every nine days, which did not meet the requirements. With the new gym, the P.E. teachers will have enough gym space to make sure all students receive the required amount of P.E. class time.

Another addition that is connected and visible from the gym is a new weight room. There are two windows on the east wall of the gym that look into the new weight room. The transfer of equipment is in progress and the new weight room will be in use shortly. As for the old weight room, the south balcony in the main gym, a new set of bleachers will be installed which will bump the capacity in the main gym up significantly. With this increase in seating, Dell Rapids will be able to host a region tournament.

Other additions and renovations include a new wrestling room, additional locker rooms, a new office for P.E. teacher Julie Barber, and an expansion of the art room, shop area, and music department. The faculty and students are grateful for the new facilities in these areas as well. These improvements are providing an enhanced learning environment for DRHS students. It is an exciting time to be roaming the halls of DRHS.

Mentoring Program under way for Dell Rapids Students

It is with great enthusiasm that we announce the beginning of our School Based Mentoring Program!

The program aims to develop positive experiences and relationships between students and volunteers that promote character development. We are working with Lutheran Social Services to pair an adult volunteer with students at our school.

Mentoring takes place once per week at school for approximately one hour at a time during the school day.
Mentors are asked to commit themselves until at least the end of the school year, with the option of starting again in the fall with the same student.

• Lutheran Social Services will screen and train all mentors. The school counselor will match the volunteer with a student. A permission letter will be sent home with students who are identified by school personnel for this program. Students are not allowed to meet with their mentor unless it is permitted by a parent.

 Mentors and students may engage in many different activities, such as working in the computer lab, reading a book, playing basketball in the gym, eating lunch, playing games, completing art projects, working on homework or just hanging out and talking.

Mentoring is linked to building positive behaviors in children, including increased self-esteem, improved academic skills, attendance and social development, greater awareness of the importance of education, heightened sense of citizenship and character development, better understanding of trusting relationships, and increased confidence.

The mentoring relationship is rewarding for adults, too. It can be a way to learn more about yourself and experience the joy of seeing a child grow and change because you are there to help.
