Local veterans Joe Thornell, Robert Risty, and Dane Stone and Legion Post 65 members will participate with Dell Rapids students and staff members in order to not only honor all veterans but to help students

CHRISTMAS FOR OUR KIDS



“Christmas for Our Kids” is a long standing community project started by Sue Horstmeyer and currently spearheaded by the local ESA women’s organization. Because of the generosity of the Dell Rapids community, we are able to ensure a Merry Christmas for all of our Dell Rapids kids. Last Christmas the ESA elves were able to deliver gifts to 98 children from 39 families in the Dell Rapids area. Those kids truly had a Merry Christmas because of your kindness.

The “Christmas for Our Kids” project works like this:

- Families in need are identified through anonymous referrals. We may all know a family in our community that is going through tough times and could use our help to provide those extras over the holidays.
- Referred families are contacted and kids “wish lists” are requested.
- These “wish lists” are filled through donations and delivered to families prior to Christmas.

"Motorized Marbles," is focused on using robotic technology to help students learn about velocity and acceleration in an exciting way. Students will use app-enabled robotic balls called Sphero 2.0 that connect through Bluetooth to a tablet and allow students to control them and make various kinds of measurements and graphs. The equipment will

allow Daugaard's students to perform a variety of experiments with velocity, acceleration and friction. Students also will learn how to graph by pencil and paper and with their tablets. He will have students graph by hand so that they will understand the basic principles, and then encourage them to use computers and tablets so they can learn the real-life tools they will be expected to use in research or on the job.

Fellowship of Christian Athletes held its first annual Breakfast of Champions kickoff for the 2015-2016 school year at the Dell Rapids High School on Friday, October 2nd. FCA has been a part of the Dell Rapids sports scene in years past, but it has been several years since it has had an active Huddle. Pastor Melissa Fletcher of First Baptist Church had been spending time praying for the community's youth. As a Dell Rapids native, she knew that sports were a big part of the students' culture. After much prayer and discernment, Pastor Fletcher and other members of the community felt a strong urging from the Lord to dedicate time to restart the FCA program in Dell Rapids. Towards the end of the last school year, the Dell Rapids Quarrier Huddle paperwork was completed and approved and a few Huddle meetings took place to promote the kickoff for the 2015-2016 season. "The students really seem to want FCA back in their school. There are some that are strong in their faith and some that are just beginning this journey and they want to be able to come together, pray for one another, their coaches, their fellow athletes and their school all the while being challenged to grow spiritually in their walk with the Lord. FCA offers them a chance to do that," Pastor Fletcher said. "We live in a world where there are a lot of hurting and broken people. Our community has experienced its share of heartache and grief and students recognize that they need something that can offer them hope. . . a positive message that they can hold on to when times get tough. . . an opportunity to share their faith with others. FCA offers that to them" she stated.

The goal is to also have a Middle School Huddle. Pastor Fletcher

stated that they are still working out the details for the younger students to have a weekly Huddle meeting time.

The Breakfast of Champions was the kick off for the Huddle activities for the school year. There were approximately 60 students and coaches in attendance. The morning began with students and coaches observing a minute of silence and prayer for



the two recent school shootings. Joe Evenson, a former Sioux Falls Storm player and current Riggs Football Academy Coach, shared his inspiring testimony of his personal athletic accomplishments and his faith journey. He challenged each person to get rid of their own gods in their life and allow the Lord to use them for His greater purposes. He reminded students that there are no coincidences in life and that everything that happens—every trial and difficult circumstance—has a grander purpose. "I thought it was a great experience that I wish everyone could've been a part of. I'm really excited about FCA starting up in our school and I think the breakfast was a great way to start it," said Mikaela Stofferahn, Senior Leader.

Pastor Fletcher reported that there was an outpouring of support from community businesses which provided all of the food for the breakfast. There are also other parents and community members that are assisting in the FCA startup efforts. "FCA is truly a community organization. It takes the entire community, families, students, coaches, churches and the blessing of God to make this organization successful. Our goal is to see everyone working together to support the students in this endeavor. It truly requires us to work as a team."

Ag In Action

Buy your FFA fruit, meat, cheese, nuts and pastry puffins NOW! The sale ends November 7th. Shipping is scheduled for the week of December 8-12, at which time all items will be sorted to ensure the highest quality, and then they will be delivered.

The twenty students enrolled in the Introduction to Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources class have been exposed to a variety of agricultural topics. During the unit on soils, students went outside and determined slope and looked at other physical properties of soil. During the unit on the FFA organization, the **State FFA Vice President, Kiera Leddy** and the **State FFA Secretary, Jeanette Klein**, talked about awards, opportunities and benefits of belonging to the FFA organization. A small wood project allowed students to design and construct a project applying concepts learned in the classroom. The unit on international agriculture will help students connect commodities produced in various countries and why they are traded. The crops and horticulture unit allows students to analyze different plant parts, functions, propagation methods, and growing requirements. The students will also compare various types of livestock and production methods used to raise those animals. This semester long class will end on January 15, but another twenty-six students will have this course during the spring semester.

The Fundamental Plant Science class is offered as a half-block class this fall with 21 students being exposed to plant parts, functions, taxonomy, nutritional requirements, biotechnology, harvesting, handling, storing and marketing crops. On October 16, **Chad Akin, Sales Representative, Dick Akin, Sales Specialist** and **Melanie Wiegert, HR Manager** from **Schuneman Equipment** in Garretson came

to demonstrate the harvesting process on the 16 acres of school land that was planted into corn this year. The students had the opportunity to ride in the combine and see the technology being utilized in equipment. The students were also informed of

career opportunities with John Deere and the support provided by local dealerships for post-secondary education. The common crops grown in the mid-west along with plant nutrients, plant propagation, pest management, storing and marketing crops will be covered during the remainder of the semester.

The other half-block class offered this fall is Fundamental Animal Science. The 22 students have gained knowledge of production practices necessary when raising livestock. The anatomy and physiology of the animals has been covered to help understand how to produce and/or manage animals in a domesticated or natural environment. Other topics to be covered during the remainder of the semester include recognizing animal behavior to facilitate working with animals safely; providing proper nutrition to maintain animal performance; knowing the factors that influence an animal's reproductive cycle; identifying environmental factors that affect an animal's performance; understanding livestock diseases; and careers related to animal science.

The processing of various agriculture products was the main emphasis of the Ag Processing Technology class. Dairy processing had students analyzing the quality factors of dairy products including fluid milk, butter, yogurt, cheese, and ice cream. Using a hand-crank butter churn from the Old Courthouse Museum, the class created homemade butter and sampled it with crackers. Ice cream was also made during class using an electric ice cream maker. The slaughter process, quality grading, yield grading and inspection were all part of the meat processing unit. On Oct. 26, 19 students in the class had the opportunity to tour

John Morrell and the Renner Locker. Other aspects of agricultural processing were covered and included handling, transporting, and marketing along with methods of processing, preserving, storing, and new technology used in processing with the class ending on Oct. 29.

The 18 students in the second quarter class of Wildlife and Fisheries started on Oct. 30 and have been going over habitat needs and how we impact wildlife. They will also be comparing large and small mammals, non-indigenous species along with upland game birds, ducks, geese, swans, and cranes in the next months of class. They will also analyze freshwater habitats and their management along with various types of fish in South Dakota. The semester will wrap up with students connecting the various career opportunities in wildlife and fisheries management. Another section of this class will be offered as a half-block class during the spring semester with 21 students enrolled.

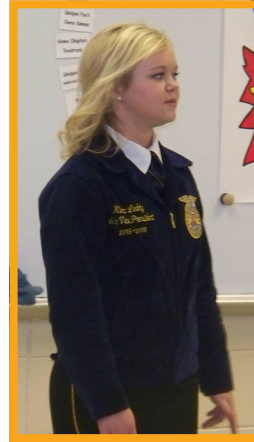
Other courses offered starting the second semester on January 19 include a quarter long Fundamental Ag Mechanics class in which the 15 students will have the opportunity to apply safety skills with engineering applications with mechanical equipment, structures, land treatment, power utilization and technology; exercise basic skills in blueprint and design development to create sketches, drawings and plans with estimate costs; develop skills required to use construction/fabrication equipment and tools; use a variety of concrete and masonry products; apply math and science principles to identify soil and water engineering and their properties; and apply metal applications.

Ag Classes Offered In The Spring

A new class for the spring semester offered as a half-block class will be Ag Business Sales and Marketing. The nine students enrolled in this class will be analyzing the use of written and oral skills to seek and obtain an agricultural job; analyzing personality traits and personal improvement needed to be successful in a career; analyzing marketing principles used to accomplish marketing objectives; analyzing basic economics of supply and demand to determine price; differentiating groups of customers and how to merchandise products to meet the needs of a customer; comparing different types of technology and documents used to manage agribusinesses; analyzing types of commodity marketing and marketing

products.

The 35 high school FFA members have been busy this fall with land judging and leadership events. Lexi Klein and Kayla Wolles attended the National FFA Convention in Louisville, KY, on Oct. 28-31. They traveled to the convention on a chartered bus organized by the South Dakota FFA Association. On

the way to the convention, they toured Fair Oaks farm in Fair Oaks, IN. Once in Louisville, they not only attended the convention session and listened to dynamic keynote speakers, they also attended the career expo in conjunction with the convention. A tour of Schimpff's Confectionery and the Louisville Zoo were also part of the trip. The Harrisburg FFA chapter hosted an invitational leadership

event on Nov. 5, which allowed members to gain experience in the various leadership events. Members can participate in five individual events which include prepared public speaking, extemporaneous speaking, job interview, ag broadcasting and creed speaking.

There are also six team events which include ag issues, ag communications, ag sales, marketing plan, junior parliamentary procedures and senior parliamentary procedures. The Jackrabbit Invitational Leadership event in Brookings on Nov. 10 gives members one more opportunity to sharpen their leadership skills before the district event. The FFA district leadership events will be held in Hartford on Nov. 16 in which members can compete in the same five individual and six team events with the top two teams and the top three individuals advancing on to the state event in Pierre on Dec. 6 & 7. Members can also apply and interview to serve as one of the six district officers for the 2015-16 year.
