

The winter season is upon us and Dell Rapids Public Schools understands that our decision to open or close schools in bad weather has a big effect on families. We also understand that our students are better served—both academically and socially—by being in school. But as always, our top priority is the safety of our students.

NOTIFICATION

DRPS will continue using the Brightarrow notification system. All registered parents will be notified of changes by email, text or phone calls. In addition, we will continue to place alerts on local radio and television stations. If you need to update your contact information, please contact the secretary at your child's school.

TIMING

Our goal is to have the decision made and on the air by 6:15 a.m. or earlier. In the event that a cancellation takes place during school hours, we will always try to provide an hour notice before excusing students.

DELAYED OPENING

DRPS will utilize a 2-hour late start for the following reasons:

- Allowing time for roads to be cleared, and
- Providing time to observe changing weather conditions.

Keep in mind; I have to consider the entire district. Conditions can be very different from one boundary to another. I urge parents to have a backup plan should school eventually be called off for the entire day. A delayed opening can often turn into a school closing, but we need the time to determine what to do. I will do all I can to have updated closings announced by 8:00 a.m.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

- Haven will be closed when school is not in session.
- AM Preschool is canceled if a delayed opening is announced.
- Breakfast is not served when school is delayed.
- Activities are canceled the entire day when school is not in session.

This includes all practices and open gyms even if the team is not school sponsored or the sun comes out.

Finally, like you, I will not always feel the right decision was made. Mother nature is a tricky thing to predict and hind sight is often a better viewpoint! Please remember that as a parent, you have the final decision as to whether your child attends school. If you decide to keep your child home, simply contact the school prior to school starting and our building principals will count your child as "excused by parent". Likewise, you are always able to pick your child up early if you feel conditions warrant.

I appreciate your cooperation and patience as we move through the winter months.



Healthy Living Youth Summit

"YOUth Choose Health", a healthy living youth leadership initiative held its training workshop in Madison on October 18, 2017.

Twenty-five students and adults participated in information sessions and activities that prepared and trained them to lead a collaborative effort in their schools, FCCLA chapters and home communities. Students were trained in areas involved in healthy lifestyles by professionals from physical and mental health organizations. In the morning, pediatric nurse practitioner Joanie Holm, Avera Medical Group in Brookings, shared the importance of healthy choices in food and physical activity for young children and teens; Dodi Haug, Northeast Prevention Resource Center, Watertown, spoke on students taking leadership to prevent destructive decisions; and Julie Moore, Avera St. Mary Foundation, Pierre, highlighted the importance of mental health and suicide prevention.

Afternoon sessions centered on teaching all ages were led by the Dakota State Department of Education. Dr. Kristine Harms and Mark Geary, faculty, and seven college students majoring in education prepared students for developing and delivering healthy living lessons. The students provided training in planning and preparing lessons, classroom management and evaluation for Summit participants to use in their schools.

Students were also given the opportunity to explore various activities and programs connected to Family, Career and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA) national programs and competitive events. In addition, each school team was provided access to an online healthy living community toolkit and other resource materials they can use to lead the initiative throughout their school year.

Faithe Larson, Veronica Vanderloo, and Illienne Jaycox and advisor Beverly Rieck from the Dell Rapids School participated in the event. Plans to share the information they gained will be done with a project and activity later in the school year.

Ag In Action

The thirteen students enrolled in the Introduction to Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources class have been exposed to a variety of agricultural topics. During the unit on soils, students went outside and determined slope and looked at other physical properties of soil. During the unit on the FFA organization, the State FFA Reporter, Avery Gilchrist and the State FFA Sentinel, Elle Moon, talked about awards, opportunities and benefits of belonging to the FFA organization on Sept. 22. A small wood project allowed students to design and construct a project applying concepts learned in the classroom. During the water unit, the students will analyze water resources and pollution. The crops and horticulture unit allows students to analyze different plant parts, functions, propagation methods and growing requirements. The students will also compare various types of livestock and production methods used to raise those animals. The unit on international agriculture will help students connect commodities produced in various countries and why they are traded. This semester long class will end on January 12, but another twenty-one students will have this course during the spring semester.

The Fundamental Plant Science class is offered as a half-block class this fall with 10 students being exposed to plant parts, functions, taxonomy, nutritional requirements, biotechnology, harvesting, handling, storing and marketing crops. The common crops grown in the mid-west along with plant nutrients, plant propagation, pest management, storing and marketing crops will be covered during the remainder of the semester.

The other half-block class offered this fall is Ag Business Sales and Marketing. The 9 students have examined skills necessary to obtain gainful employment in agribusiness occupations; examine effects of personality on job performance; use principles to accomplish an agribusiness marketing objective; use sales principles to accomplish an agribusiness objective; use computer technology and documents to manage agribusiness inventory; explore opportunities for marketing of agricultural products throughout the world.

For the first quarter, twenty-one students were enrolled in Fundamental Animal Science. These students gained knowledge of production practices necessary when raising livestock. The anatomy and physiology of the animals has been covered to help understand how to produce and/or manage animals in a domesticated or natural environment. Other topics to be covered during the remainder of the semester include: recognizing animal behavior to facilitate working with animals safely; provide proper nutrition to maintain

animal performance; know the factors that influence an animal's reproductive cycle; identify environmental factors that affect an animal's performance; livestock diseases and careers related to animal science. Another section of this class will be offered for the second semester, but will be a half-block class so it will last the entire second semester for the 21 students enrolled in it.

The second quarter started on Oct. 30th and the 4th block class switched to Fundamental Ag Mechanics. The twenty-four in this class students will have the opportunity to apply safety skills with engineering applications with mechanical equipment, structures, land treatment, power utilization and technology; exercise basic skills in blueprint and design development to create sketches, drawing and plans with estimate costs; develop skills required to use construction/fabrication equipment and tools; use a variety of concrete and masonry products; apply math and science principles to identify soil and water engineering and their properties; apply metal applications.

Other courses offered starting the second semester on January 16 include two sections of Wildlife and Fisheries offered as half-block classes. One section will have 18 students and the other will have 24 students who will be exposed to habitat needs and how we impact wildlife. They will also be comparing large and small mammals, non-indigenous species along with upland game birds, ducks, geese, swans and cranes. They will also analyze freshwater habitats and their management along with various types of fish in South Dakota. The students will also connect the various career opportunities in wildlife and fisheries management. Another half-block class offered second semester will be Ag Processing Technology. Those fifteen students will analyze the processing of various agriculture products. During the dairy processing unit, students will be analyzing the quality factors of dairy products including fluid milk, butter, yogurt, cheese and ice cream. Using a hand-crank butter churn from the Old Courthouse Museum, the class will create home-made butter and sample it with crackers. Ice cream will also be made during class using an electric ice cream maker. The slaughter process, quality grading, yield grading and inspection are all part of the meat processing unit. Other aspects of agricultural processing will be covered which include handling, transporting and marketing along with methods of

processing, preserving, storing and new technology used in processing. A field trip to tour Smithfield Foods is normally part of this class.

The 33 high school FFA members have been busy this fall with land judging and leadership events. Noah Randall, Kenyon Shellum, Ethan Hollaren, Logan Anderson, Kyle Cavigielli, Tate Flaskey, Mitchell Geraets and Nychole Steineke attended the Parker Land Judging event on Sept. 19 with the team placing 14th.
