



# AGIN ACTION

he Ag III/IV classes have just finished up their individual projects in the shop and are now returning to the classroom to cover a unit on wildlife. This unit consists of identification of various species of wildlife including their tracks, population density, habitat requirements and taxidermy. Agricultural machinery will be the next unit of instruction which includes selection, cost and maintenance.

Livestock nutrition is the topic being covered by the Ag II students. They have been exposed to the basic nutrient requirements of animals and how to balance the ration according to the animal's needs. Following the nutrition unit, common livestock diseases will be discussed along with methods to prevent and treat those diseases.

The welding students are working on finishing up their individual metal projects as this class will end on March 10. The Small Engine class will start on March 11 with the start of the fourth quarter. The students will go through various engine information in the classroom before going to the shop to work on engines. The classroom instruction will include safety, tools, fasteners, principles of operation, 2 and 4 cycle engines, engine performance, emission controls, carburetion, ignition systems, lubrication systems, cooling systems and preventative maintenance and troubleshooting.

The FFA chapter just finished celebrating National FFA Week. The chapter sponsored an Agriculture Trivia quiz that was available to all students and staff. Rolls were provid-

ed for staff members to show appreciation for all that they do to support the agriculture program and the FFA organization. FFA members could drive tractors to school to show their ties to production agriculture. The ag students had the ability to participate in agriculture Olympic activities. The games were set up to test their skills in different agriculture areas. March is the busiest month of the year for the FFA members because they are working to sharpen their skills to compete at the State FFA Convention. The career development events that members can attend are: March 4 at Tri-Valley, March 10 at DeSmet, March 16 at Flandreau and March 27 at the Little International at SDSU in Brookings. The members will pick a specific event to participate in and compete with other FFA members from the surrounding area. 🐧




