

# AGINACTION

Summer time does not mean time off for FFA members as members participate in a variety of events. John Elverson and Nick Siemonsma along with their advisor Mr. Wolff, attended the Washington Leadership

Conference on July 7-12. This conference

focused on taking their leadership skills to the highest level by learning to know their purpose, value people, take action and serve others. Located in our nation's capitol, the Washington Leadership Conference was a five day event that trained FFA members to make a positive impact in their school, local community, state and country. The capstone event of WLC was a civic engagement activity, which took leadership and service learning to new standards. National FFA partners with the Mid-Atlantic Gleaning Networks and the students during the 5th week-long session picked sweet corn to be used to feed less fortunate people in the Washington, DC area. John and Nick also increased their understanding of the nation's heritage with visits to Arlington National Cemetery, the Jefferson, Lincoln and Roosevelt Memorials and other historic sites in Washington, DC. Having a chance to take a tour of the US Capitol building, visiting the offices of Senator John Thune and Senator Tim Johnson along with visiting with Congresswoman Stephanie Herseth Sandlin on the steps of the House was a major highlight of the trip. On the return trip, John and Nick and Mr. Wolff also attended the FFA Day at the Dome in Minneapolis, which included a special picnic for FFA members before the game between the Twins and White Sox.

Each year the South Dakota Association of Cooperatives sends out a quiz to high school agriculture programs that relates to cooperatives and how they conduct business. The quiz is used as SDAC's method of selecting youth to attend the National Institute of Cooperative Education. Nick Siemonsma was selected to attend this year's summer institute which was held at the University of Tennessee in Knoxville, TN on July 25 through July 29 with approximately 125 youth attending. It was an excellent conference on the Cooperative way of doing business.

The FFA division at the Sioux Empire Fair had Nick Siemonsma exhibiting his hogs on Wednesday, Aug. 12. Members of the Dell Rapids FFA chapter along with students enrolled in the high school agriculture classes will have the opportunity to attend the Dakotafest Farm Show in Mitchell on Wednesday, August 19. The students will be attending educational forums to put them in touch with the latest happenings in the industry. Some of the topics include: federal updates from the South Dakota Congressional Delegates, hear about alternative energy as well as look at exhibits from more than 500 companies located on more than 45 acres of land.

The South Dakota State Fair, which will be held Sept. 3-7 in Huron, has a special division for FFA members to exhibit a variety of things. Included in the division are: chapter exhibits, ag projects, horticulture, agri-science exhibits, market swine, breeding ewes, market lambs, breeding heifers, market heifers and steers, dairy heifers and cows, and rabbits. The deadline for entry forms is Aug. 14.

Since AgIII/IV will be combined and will be offered as a skinny class, they will meet the entire year and will be covering: parliamentary procedures, agricultural sales, electricity, record keeping, financial analysis, agricultural law, taxes, precision agriculture, agricultural communications, managerial leadership skills, personal development and shop projects. The unit on parliamentary procedures will consist of parliamentary rules and methods. The agricultural sales unit will include analyzing various sales methods, advertising and salesmanship. Basic wiring, electrical controls and safety will be included in the electricity unit. The record keeping unit will include various records kept in agriculture and the importance of complete records. The unit on financial analysis will include cash flow, supply and demand and budgeting. The legal aspects that apply to agriculture will be covered in the agricultural law unit. The unit on taxes will consist of distinguishing various tax planning procedures. The precision agriculture unit will include the GPS technology in agriculture and how it influences production. The industry trends, writing trends, visual trends and the future of the industry will be covered in the agriculture communications unit. The managerial leadership skills unit will consist of problem solving and decision making, goal setting, time management and positive reinforcement and motivation. Self concept, attitudes and ethics in the workplace are areas that will be covered in the personal development unit. The shop projects will consist of mechanical, metal or wood projects that will be planned, constructed and paid for by the student.

Ag Manufacturing will be offered as a skinny class as well and will meet the entire year. This class will be an extension of the skills learned in Ag II, Ag III or Welding. The students will be primarily in the shop constructing larger projects both out of wood and metal. Other areas could include individual mechanics or electrical projects. The projects will be developed and paid for by the students.

The Ag I student will have a full block class and will meet for the first semester. During their time in class, they will be covering: crop science, managing our natural resources, introductory horticulture, shop safety, shop tools and wood project, FFA, international agriculture and careers. The crops unit will include identification of small grains, row crops, forages and weeds. The environmental requirement and uses will also be covered. The natural resource unit will include the study of soil and water management, forestry and fish and wildlife management. Careers in natural resources will also be included. The introductory horticulture unit will include plant functions, propagation, plant needs and careers in horticulture. The shop unit will consist of going over shop safety and tool identification. The shop work will consist of designing and constructing a small wood project paid for by the student. The FFA unit will give the students a background of the history, opportunities, leadership skills and records kept as a member of the organization. Each student can then decide if they would like to belong to the FFA organization. The international agriculture unit will allow students to analyze commodities grown in other countries, how they are traded and how that affects us as both producers and consumers. The careers unit will expose the students to the large scope of agricultural careers.

Small Engines will be held the first quarter and will consist of: safety and tools; fasteners, sealants and gaskets; engine construction and principles of operation; two-cycle and four-cycle engines; measuring engine performance; fuel and emission control systems; carburetion; ignition systems; lubrication systems; cooling systems; preventive maintenance and troubleshooting; inspection, disassembly, servicing and reconditioning. After the classroom instruction, the Ag I students will have the opportunity to work on engines in the shop. This could include general maintenance, adjustment and tuning or complete disassembly and repair.



he Dell Rapids School District participates in the National School Lunch, School Breakfast, and Special Milk Programs. Lunchtime Solutions provides complete, well balanced, Type A meals that are attractive and satisfying to students. All students are encouraged to enjoy the nutritious meals that include an all-you-can-eat salad bar.

Applications for free and reduced price meals are mailed to each family with registration or open-house information and are also available in the principals' offices. Parents that wish to apply for free or reduced price meals for their children should return their application form to the business office. Students may buy breakfast for \$1.20 at each school. The daily price for lunch at the elementary school is \$2.10, and the daily price for lunch at the middle school and high school is \$2.20. The price for an Adult Meal is \$2.80. The

price for an extra milk, or milk for elementary breaks, is \$.40. An Extra Entrée is \$1.50 and an extra pizza slice is \$1.75.

# SCHOOL LUNCH

A selection of a la carte items are available for purchase in the middle school and high school after the purchase of a complete meal. Parents are able to place restrictions on student purchases of a la carte items. Accounts may be restricted to allow no purchasing of a la carte items, to place a dollar limit on daily a la carte charges, or to allow a la carte purchases with cash only. To request account restrictions for the 2009-2010 school year, parents should call the business manager or

food service director at 428-5473.

The district uses NutriKids computer software for record keeping. Each student has his/her own lunch account, and the district requires payment in advance for students to purchase meals or a la carte items. Any dollar amount can be deposited toward future purchases. It is recommended that deposits into students' accounts be made by check. Meals may also be purchased with cash at the point of service.

Through the MyNutriKids.com website, parents are able to use a convenient, easy and secure online prepayment service to deposit money into their child's school meal account. This service also provides parents the ability to view their child's account balance and print out a copy of their child's eating history report for the past thirty days. ## Annual Notice of Privacy Rights

his notice informs parents and eligible students (those 18 and older) of their rights concerning access to educational records, limitations on disclosure of record information, the opportunity to challenge the content of education records, and provisions for filing a complaint with HEW. These rights are spelled out in Public Law 98-380 as amended by Public Law 93-568, and in regulations published by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare in the June 17, 1976, Federal Register.

The law, and regulations published by the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, requires educational institutions to:

Provide parents and eligible students the opportunity to inspect student educational records. This can be done by contacting the school principal.

Provide parents opportunities for a

hearing to challenge the content of the student's education record when they believe it contains information that is inaccurate, misleading, or in violation of the student's right or privacy. (Grades are NOT subject to challenge.)

Parents of dependent students will have access to the educational record. This agency will assume that the student is dependent on the parent(s)' claim as a tax exemption until we are otherwise notified.

This agency will publish directory information, collective, or individually unless a parent/eligible student within twenty days after receipt of this notice notifies the privacy officer in writing that any or all of the categories listed below should not be released without prior written consent. The directory information published will include the following: name, listing, date and place of birth,

major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities, sports weight and height of athletic team members, dates of attendance, awards received, and most recent previous educational institution.

Copies of district policy and implementation procedures are available upon request from the Superintendent's office.

Parents or eligible students may file a complaint with HEW if they believe their rights under this law have been violated and efforts to resolve the situation through MCPS appeal channels have not proved satisfactory. Complaints should be addressed to FERPA, HEW (Room 514E, 200 Independence Avenue, SW, Washington, DC 20201).

Eligible student means a student who has attained eighteen years of age, or is attending an institution of post secondary education.

#### **Dell Rapids School District Parent Notification:**

#### "No Child Left Behind"

The federal education law known as "No Child Left Behind Act" was put in place by President Bush and requires that all parents in a Title I school be notified and given the opportunity to request information about the professional qualifications of classroom teachers instructing their child. The Dell Rapids School District provides Title I services to students in the elementary school. If you are interested in obtaining the information concerning the professional qualifications of the classroom teachers instructing your child, you may send your written request to the building principal who will provide a response.

### School District Wellness Policy

n accordance with federal requirements, the Dell Rapids School District has adopted a Wellness Policy and Regulations that support student achievement and the development of lifelong wellness practices through the promotion of healthy eating and physical activity. The policy includes nutrition, physical activity, nutrition education, and other school based activity components. A committee of school board members, school administrators, food service and health professionals, teachers, parents, and students meets annually to review the policy and recommend

changes to the school board.

The goal of the physical activity component is to provide opportunities for students to develop physical activity skills, maintain physical fitness, and understand the benefits of a physically active and healthful lifestyle. Physical activity will not be used as punishment, and use of physical activity time for make-up work and testing will be limited.

Nutrition standards require that federal requirements are followed in the school lunch and breakfast program. Teachers and parents are encouraged to include healthful food

### **Activity Tickets**

All elementary, middle and senior high students should buy activity tickets on their registration day. They serve as student identification for admittance to most activities conducted by the Dell Rapids Public Schools. Activity tickets also serve as identification for student prices at other activities. The cost of a high school activity ticket is \$20. The cost of a middle school activity ticket is \$15. Any elementary school student may buy the \$15 ticket for use during the 2009-2010 school year. Activity tickets will be sold to students in grades K-12 on their registration day, and will be available at the first home football and home volleyball games.

Activity Admission prices are \$4/ adults and \$2/students. Doubleheader prices are \$5/adults and \$3/students. Senior citizens (age 62 and over) may pick up a free season pass for events at the HS/District office.

#### Senior Citizen Activity Passes

Senior Citizens (age 62 & over) who are residents of the Dell Rapids School District can receive free admission to most Dell Rapids Public School athletic events. A card is required to receive free admission. Free season passes may be picked up at the HS/District office. §

could get assignments from a friend. If a student knows that they will be missing school they should contact the office for an advance make-up slip before



## AHERA Asbestos Warning

'n accordance with the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA), it is the school district's duty to inform you that the buildings of the Dell Rapids School District contain some asbestos material. This asbestos material is located in the floor tiles of all our buildings. There are certain procedures which are required of the school district when dealing with the asbestos material. The law for the protection of all school personnel mandates these procedures. Every effort will be made to utilize precautions, so that the students and employees will not be subjected to unnecessary asbestos material. Asbestos floor tiles are located in classrooms, hallways and gymnasiums. This asbestos material is not friable in nature, and if properly maintained, is not considered to be a health hazard.

An AHERA building inspection and management plan, prepared by ATC Associates, Inc., has been submitted to the Department of Water and Natural Resources in Pierre, and one is on file and is available to any interested parent, employee or patron for inspection during regular school hours. The management plan may be reviewed at no cost. If someone would wish to have a complete copy of the management plan, we would prepare one at a cost of \$25.00.

## Birth Certificates/ Immunization Law

It is a requirement that schools have on file a copy of a certified birth certificate from each newly enrolled student. This law affects all students moving into the district, as well as all incoming kindergartners.

A certified copy of a birth record may be obtained from the South Dakota Department of Health, Vital Records office, 523 E. Capitol, Pierre, SD 57501. Birth records may

also be obtained from the county offices where the child was born. (Records for adopted children or children born out-of-wed-lock are available only at the state office.) Birth records of children born out-of-state must be obtained from the state. To receive a certified copy of a birth record, send the child's name, date of birth and a \$5 fee to the appropriate county or state office.

Schools are also required to have on file verification that each student has had his/her appropriate number of immunizations. In South Dakota, each student entering school must have two immunizations for mumps, measles, and rubella (MME). All kindergarten students are also required to have the Chicken Pox immunization. The certified copy of the birth record and immunization records must be presented on or before the date of enrollment in school.



## Policy on Administering Medications at School

Schools assume great responsibility when administering medications to students. Therefore, parents must strive to give students required medications outside of school hours whenever possible. Many medications can be given outside of school hours by asking your doctor.

All medications which must be taken at school must be in a container from the pharmacy labeled with the student's name, name of the medication, correct dose, time to be given, and doctor's name (no unlabeled medication will be given). Ask your pharmacist for a second container with the above information on


the label for school use. Every medication must have a written request slip with the student's name, dose, time to be given, and a parent's signature. No telephone permission will be allowed.

Only the school nurse and those who have taken a medication administration course will be allowed to measure medications. If a liquid medication must be taken at school it must be sent to school on a daily basis with only the amount to be given that day. The container will be returned to the student to take home to be refilled for the next day. A small bottle with the correct labels should be obtained from your phar-

macist.

All students at the middle school/ high school will be required to take their own medications. The office may keep the medication bottle and remind the student to take the medication.

All scheduled II controlled substances such as Ritalin and Dexedrine, must be brought to the school by the parents. Transportation of these medications by the student will not be allowed. Parents must bring in enough medication for one calendar month at the beginning of the month and the empty bottle will be sent home with the student at the end of the month for a refill.



#### **Transportation**

he Dell Rapids Public School has contracted with Mid States School Bus, Inc. to continue providing the best transportation services possible to the students and community. Students who reside outside of city limits are provided transportation services at no cost. Free transportation services are also provided to St. Mary Catholic School students who may board the buses at locations on the public school bus route, as allowed in SDCL 13-29-1.2. Open-enrolled students and in-town students may pay for buses passes that allow them to board the buses at designated stops.

Parents are requested to have their children at the bus stop at the appropriate time so the bus will not have to wait for the students and the students will not be left behind.

Because of snow, mud, or poorly graveled surfaces, bus service on certain roads may have to be curtailed from time to time. When bus service must be curtailed, it will be the duty of the driver on such route to notify those patrons affected by the curtailment.

The school bus driver has the responsibility of maintaining proper student behavior on the bus. Students causing continuous problems will be reported to the principal for disciplinary action. All students who ride any of our school buses are subject to rules and regulations as set forth by the State of South Dakota as well as our own school board. Any violation of the rules does not afford our school bus drivers an opportunity to provide safe transportation, which is their main responsibility.

- First Offense the bus manager will call the parents and send a report to the parents and principal.
- Second Offense the bus manager will call the parents, send a report to the school and parents, and talk with the student.
- Third Offense the bus manager will enforce a suspension and work with the school to try to change the behavior of the student before the student is allowed back on the bus.

Parents are encouraged to talk first with the bus manager, and then with the building principal, for any and all questions.

#### **Tobacco Policy**

The Dell Rapids Board of Education recognizes that tobacco products pose a serious threat to the health and well-being of the District's students and employees. Therefore, the Board has developed the following policy which applies to all individuals regardless of age and regardless of whether they may legally use tobacco products.

The Board of Education hereby prohibits the use of all tobacco products by staff members, employees, visitors, or guests in all District buildings, on grounds, and in all school vehicles at all times.

A ll students of the district will have equal educational opportunities. The Board will not discriminate on the basis of race, color, creed, religion, gender, disability, economic status, national origin, or ancestry in its policies or programs.

To accomplish this policy on nondiscrimination, the Board will make every effort to provide all students equal access with respect to admission or membership in schoolsponsored organizations, clubs, or activities; access to facilities; distribution of funds; academic evaluations; or any other aspect of school-sponsored programs or activities.

### **Sportsmanship**

oncern over poor sportsmanship on the part of some athletes, parents, fans, and coaches has been expressed at several levels. At the state level, the South Dakota High School Activities Association has asked all member schools to review expectations and to address the issue.

Coaches have been instructed to require our athletes to be good sports and to model the ideals of sportsmanship themselves. Athletes have been told that displays of misconduct on the field or court will result in temporary removal from the game and that repeated instances will result in removal from the sport.

#### **Insurance Notes**

he school does not carry insurance to pay for school related accidents. If an

accident occurs, all costs from the accident are the responsibility of the person hav-

ing the accident. Persons are encouraged to carry accident insurance.

Student Accident Insurance is available through Student Assurance Services, Inc., of Stillwater, Minn. The school district will include a brochure in each student's registration packet. To be eligible for coverage the enrollment form must be returned to the company in the self-addressed envelope enclosed in the packet. Claim forms will be available from the principal throughout the year with coverage subject to the terms of the plans listed on the brochures. The school district does not attempt to become an agent for the company and further questions may be directed to insurance agent, David Desch at 800-328-2739.






