Winter is coming! As I write this, the East Coast is getting hit with Hurricane Sandy along with a Nor'easter. Things don't look good for the citizens of New England. Hundreds of thousands of people are evacuating their homes hoping to return to a livable situation. Although last year's winter was unseasonably mild, we need to be prepared for more of our standard snowy season. Superintendent Schultz recently sent home her guidelines of calling off school for the extreme days of winter. Preparing for the typical winter weather is also important concerning students in school.

Kindergarten through eighth grade students will typically go out at least once a day to get fresh air and expend pent-up energy. Recess supervisors watch the weather and adjust the number of time outside as well as the length. When student safety is a concern, recess will be held inside. It is amazing how the view of 30 degrees changes from October to January. It first is viewed as cold, then as normal, and finally as warm. With this in mind, please make sure that clothing and outerwear is appropriate for students. Students are sometimes reluctant to put the flip-flops, slippers, and sandals away and replace them with shoes or boots that offer more protection. The same applies with weather-appropriate coats, hats, and gloves. We've been fortunate that buses have not encountered trouble in the recent past winters, but being over-prepared is most prudent. Students traveling to and from activities on buses should be wearing or packing these items since trips are typically longer and later in the day.

I recently read an article on middle school growth and development that included some interesting information. The article had some interesting facts concerning a middle-schooler's sleep and nutritional needs. The adolescent brain needs sleep to develop appropriately. Middle school students need at least ten hours of sleep per night. Not many middle school students want to go to bed at nine thirty, but this is what our house has come up with by counting backwards from wake-up time. Why is sleep so important? During the growth spurts of adolescence, the brain is pruning the electronic highways between different parts of the brain. This means the adolescent brain is constantly re-wiring itself and this is accomplished during sleep. The parts of the brain that involve sensory perception, spatial reasoning, conscious thought and language develops between the ages of 11 and 15 in females and from the late teens to early 20s in males. The article also contained information revealing the increased nutritional needs to support physical growth during the adolescent years. This growth spurt rivals the growth spurt of toddlers and requires fuel. Keeping healthy snacks available for in between meals is important and necessary. If your pantry is anything like mine, keeping it stocked is a constant challenge. It is impossible to hide the chips from a middle school student...believe me, I've tried. Having more nutritious alternatives will help students through it.

The last item I'd like to touch on is the upcoming election. The struggles our district encountered in getting the approval to build our elementary school should teach us something. Every vote is important in conveying the views of the citizenry. This year the ballot has a couple important items that could change education as we know it. Initiated Measure 15 would add a 1 cent state sales tax, expected or raise \$175 million to \$180 million annually, to be split evenly between K-12 education and Medicaid. Referred Law 16 will either approve the education reform act created by last year's legislators or stop the law from being enacted. We have all been receiving fliers in the mail addressing these issues and, as a school employee; I can't attempt to persuade you one way or the other in the *Wise Owl*. Educating yourself on these two important issues is essential to voting in an informed fashion.

Winter is right around the corner. This seems like a good time to create a plan for school-aged children in the event of weather closings or cancellations. Dell Rapids Public Schools understands that our decision to open or close schools has a large effect on our families; however our top priority is the safety of our students. The following information can be used to assist you in preparing your winter weather plan with your children.

How do we make our decision?

School closings are based on careful analysis of many factors including:

- Information on road conditions from transportation staff and local authorities.
- Even if your road looks clear, travel somewhere else in the district may be dangerous.
- We always consider that many of our high school students drive themselves to school.
- The amount of snow, fog, and ice accumulated by the storm and also the forecast for the remainder of the day.
- Building conditions such as whether we have proper electricity, heat, and utilities.
- Facility conditions including lots and sidewalks.
- Temperature and wind chill. We look seriously at closure when the actual temperatures are in the -25 to -30 range.
- What decisions other school districts are making plays a part. Please remember that each district is unique in the types of land and terrain that they consider into their decisions. No two districts are exactly alike.

How is the public notified?

DRPS will continue using the School Reach notification system. All registered parents will be notified of changes by email and phone calls. In addition, we will continue to place alerts on local radio and television stations. Please do not call the school district telephones unless it is an emergency. If you need to update your contact information, please contact the Middle School Office at 428-5473 ext.2.

When is the decision made?

Our goal is to have the decision made and on the air by 6 a.m. or earlier. In the event that a cancellation takes place during school hours, we will always try and give a one hour notice to parents before we excuse for the day. Please remember that Haven will not be open on days that the school closes early.

Although my staff and I do our absolute best with this bad weather process, we know that often no perfect decision exists. If you as a parent feel as it is not safe for your child to attend school, please keep your student(s) home. Contact the school prior to school starting and our building Principals will count your child as excused by parent. You as parents make the final decision on the safety of your child.

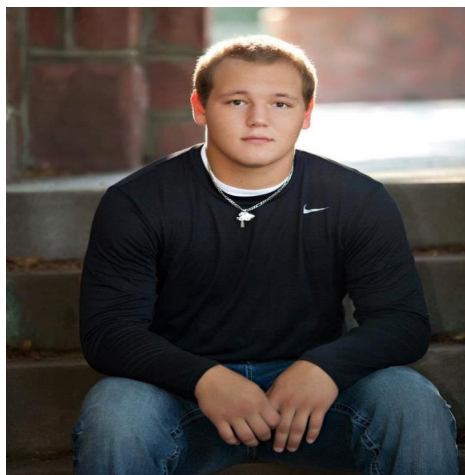

very deserving student in Cole Langer.

Langer has been very successful academically in his high school career. He has been on the honor roll all four years and any teacher will say he keeps up with his work very well. Langer has also been a Peer Helper since he was a freshman, and was inducted into the National Honor Society his junior year.

The name "Cole Langer" is not just known in Dell Rapids, but, if asked, people all over the state would know who he is; one of the finest prep athletes in the state. He won the Coaches Award his sophomore year and won third in shot put and eighth in discus, and in his junior year he won the Coaches Award and second in shot put.

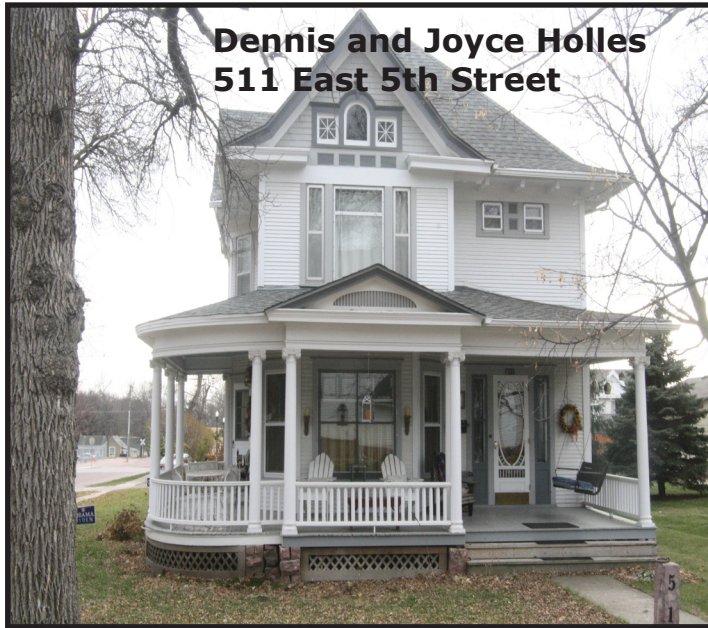

Ag in Action

The students enrolled in the Introduction to Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources toured Dell Rapids Lumber on October 12 to learn about the various materials to choose from when constructing their wood projects. They have since finished constructing a small wood project in the shop and have now returned to the classroom. They are currently working on the water unit which consists of identifying sources of water, water pollution and water conservation. Following the water unit, they will be exposed to the forestry industry.

With the start of the 2nd quarter on Oct. 22, the Fundamental Ag Mechanics class started. The 19 students in this class have just finished up a unit on concrete which exposed the students to the various components, mixing, forms and types of concrete. Land descriptions, map reading and using hand-held GPS units is now the focus of the students. The next unit will be over hydraulics systems, how they work and their various components.

The soybean crop planted on the FFA land lab consisting of 16 acres of school

owned land east of the football field, was harvested on Sept. 27. Arthur Eulberg volunteered his time and equipment to combine the 534.33 bushels of soybeans. The income from the sale of the crop goes into the chapter account to fund all of the FFA activities throughout the year.

Each year the State FFA Officers visit each chapter in the state. This year Taylor Leonhardt, the SD State FFA President and Ashley Tonak, the SD State FFA Secretary came to Dell Rapids on Friday, Oct. 12. They presented workshops to the two sections of Fundamental Animal Science about working as a team, challenging yourself, taking risks, advocating for agriculture and the benefits of being an FFA member.

The five members who attended the National FFA Convention in Indianapolis, IN on Oct. 24-27, 2012, were Heidi Anderson, Matt Boever, A.J. Peterson, Deni Ahlers and Demi Erickson. In addition to the members attending, Mr. Tom Wolff, the FFA Advisor, also attended as one of the chaperones for all of the members attending from South Dakota on the state chartered busses. On the way to the convention, they stopped at Waterloo, IA for a tour of the John Deere manufactur-

ing plant where they make tractors ranging from 125 to 560 horsepower. Once in Indianapolis, the members also got to tour the National FFA Center and attend a rodeo. While at the convention they attended various business sessions and the career show along with participating in the Rally to Fight Hunger where about 10,000 members and advisors helped to pack 1 million meals during the three days of the convention to provide relief from hunger and malnutrition.

The members who have prepared to demonstrate their leadership skills will have the opportunity to compete against FFA members from other chapters in the Jackrabbit Invitational Leadership event in Brookings on Nov. 8. The district leadership career development events will be held at Hartford on Nov. 13. Members can compete in ten different leadership areas, with the top 3 from each area advancing onto the state competition in Pierre on Dec. 2-3, 2012. FFA is conducting their annual fruit sale. The sale will end on Nov. 9 with the order being placed and the products should be in the week of Dec. 3-7. 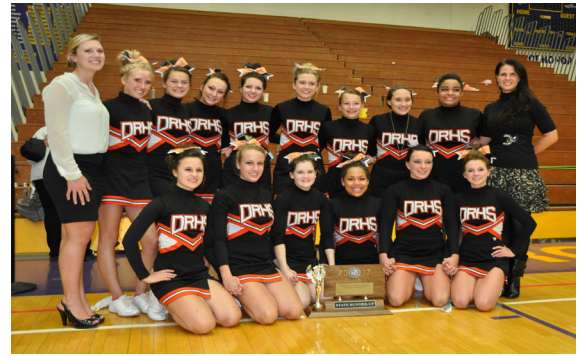

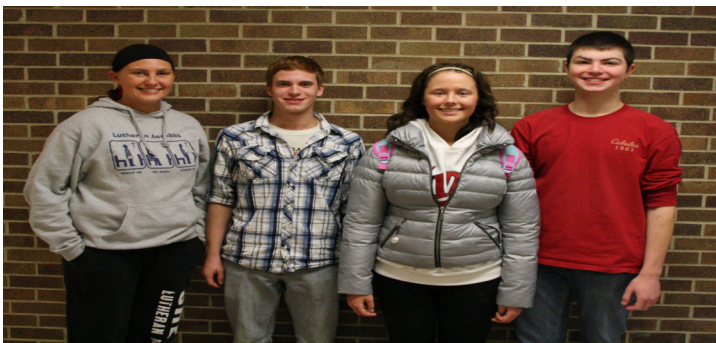
Once a student experiences this camp they usually recommend it to others as an opportunity to check out the workforce before they make a final life choice.

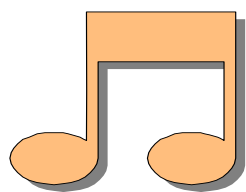

8th Grade Volleyball Wrap-Up

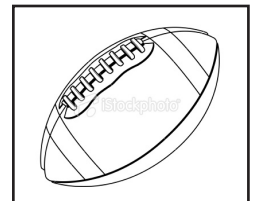

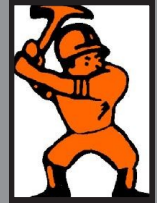

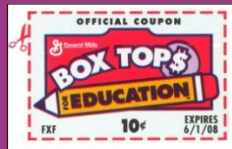
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
