Winter Weather Update

The **winter season** is upon us and Dell Rapids Public School District understands that our decision to open or close schools in bad weather has a big effect on our families. We also understand that our students are better served—both academically and socially—by being in school. But as always, our top priority is the safety of our students.

How do we make our decision?

Please understand that we make the decision to open or close the schools based on a careful analysis of all relevant factors, such as:

- Information on road conditions from transportation staff and local authorities.
- Even if your road looks clear, travel somewhere else in the district may be dangerous.
- We always consider that many of our high school students drive themselves to school.
- Consider the amount of snow, fog, and ice accumulated by the storm and also the forecast for the balance of the day.
- Building conditions such as whether we have proper electricity, heat, and utilities.
- Temperature and wind chill.
- Neighboring school district decisions play a role, but please remember no two districts are exactly alike.

Why a Delayed Opening?

2-hour late starts are utilized for a variety of reasons but most importantly, the decision allows for a more informed decision after roads have time to be cleared and the day's weather pattern is better determined. Please understand, delayed openings can easily turn into a full day closing, and that decision can be made as late as 8:00 a.m. I understand this can be disruptive to working parents, and I apologize for the inconvenience.

How is the public notified?

Dell Rapids will continue to use a parent notification system this year, however, a change in companies will begin in November. As no system is 100% accurate, I encourage you to use Keloland and KSFY news stations as well.

When is the decision made?

Our goal is to have the decision made and on the air by 6 a.m. or earlier. If I wait longer to announce a school closing, some parents will have already left for work, leaving their children unsupervised. We are surprised sometimes with bad weather moving in later in the morning, but that doesn't happen very often. If it does happen later in the day, we will always try and give a one-hour notice to parents before we excuse for the day.

Additional Information:

- Haven will be closed for all weather relating closings or delays.
- AM Preschool is canceled if a delayed opening is announced.
- Breakfast is not served when school is delayed.
- All activities, including open gyms and voluntary practices, are canceled when school is not in session.

The final decision is always with the parent(s)!

Although my staff and I do our absolute best with this bad weather process, we know that often no perfect decision exists. If you as a parent feel as though it is not safe for your child to attend school, please keep your student(s) home. Our building Principals will count your child as excused by parent.

You as parents make the final decision on the safety of your child.

Here's hoping for a calm and unseasonably warm winter season!

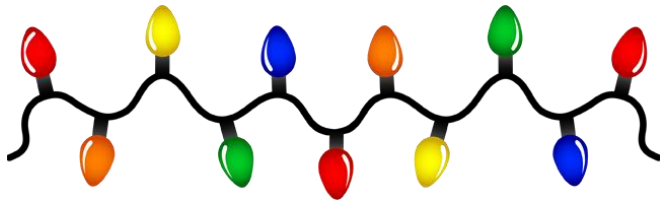

Middle and High School Program "Notes" from Mrs. Z

Concert time is quickly approaching, and I would like to take this opportunity to share information with you that your middle and/or high school student may not have given you. I would also like to thank you in advance for making sure that your student is at his/her required performance.

Our Choral Christmas Concert is scheduled for **Tuesday, Dec. 2, 2014**, at 7:00 PM in the high school gym. All 5th and 6th grade students are to perform at this concert. Others performing are the 7/8th Grade Choir, and the High School Choir.

Clothing for respectful concert etiquette:

The High School Choir wears their black polo shirts, black slacks, and black shoes and socks. Middle school students should wear nice slacks and a nice top that does not have writing or pictures on it. The color does not matter. Girls are encouraged to wear dresses or skirts (although nice slacks are also just fine), remembering that they should be no shorter than 2 or 3 inches above the knee. If the top has straps or is strapless, a light jacket or sweater should be worn. No bare shoulders please!! I ask the middle school students to please not wear blue jeans (however, other colored jeans are okay), shorts, or sweat pants. These requirements are a part of their learning about correct concert etiquette.

Please help me with your student's education by setting good examples as audience members. Although there are many students singing at the same time, when they get in front of an audience, they often times become a bit intimidated by the large audience, and therefore do not sing out as bravely as they do in class. We need our audience to be respectfully quiet and staying in their seats during each selection that is sung. Each group that performs will have spent a great deal of time working on their pieces, and deserve to have a full audience for their part of the concert. Please plan on staying for the entire concert, which will last approximately one hour.

If you would like to plan ahead, the date for our Spring Concert is **Monday, April 13, 2015**. It also will take place in the high school gym, and is scheduled for 7:00 PM.

Ag in Action

Buy your FFA fruit, meat, cheese, nuts and pastry puffins NOW! The sale ends November 7th. Shipping is scheduled for the week of December 8-12, at which time all items will be sorted to ensure the highest quality, and then they will be delivered.

DRHS Ag class numbers are strong, and students get a variety of experiences in those classes with Mr. Tom Wolff. The eighteen students enrolled in the Introduction to Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources class heard from **Mary Lou Lacey** from the **Minnehaha county Natural Resource Conservation Service** who talked to the class about what she does as a soil conservationist and the tools she uses to complete some of her tasks. During the unit on the FFA organization, the **State FFA Treasurer, Nichole Hamilton** (pictured below on the left) and the **State FFA Reporter, Jennifer Emery** (pictured below on the right) talked about awards, opportunities and benefits of belonging to the FFA organization on Sept. 29.



This semester long class will end on January 16, but another twenty-eight students will have this course during the spring semester.

The 24 Ag Processing students will have the opportunity to tour John Morrell and the Renner Locker on Nov. 11. The 28 students in Wildlife and Fisheries will be comparing large and small mammals, non-indigenous species along with upland game birds, ducks, geese, swans and cranes in the next months of class. Another section of this class will be offered during the spring semester with 20 students enrolled.

The Fundamental Plant Science class ended on Oct. 28 with those 22 students being exposed to plant parts, functions, taxonomy, nutritional requirements, biotechnology, harvesting, handling, storing and marketing crops. On October 16, **Brett Steinocker**, sales manager, **Dick Akin**, sales representative and **Haley**

Rawsthorne, HR representative from **Schuneman Equipment** in Garretson came to demonstrate the harvesting process on the 16 acres of school land that was planted into soybean this year. (pictured below)



Dwayne Ingalls, a grain marketing specialist with **Swenson Investments and Commodities** exposed students to some marketing strategies that can help maximize profits on Oct. 23rd.

Ag Classes Offered in the Spring

During the second quarter, 17 students will be in Fundamental Animal Science.

Other courses offered starting the second semester on January 19 include Fundamental Ag Mechanics in which the 18 students will have the opportunity to apply safety skills with engineering applications with mechanical equipment, structures, land treatment, power utilization and technology. The quarter long class of Advanced Ag Mechanics will be held during 4th block in the spring. The students will be primarily in the shop constructing larger projects both out of wood and metal. Other areas could include individual mechanics or electrical projects. The projects will be developed and paid for by the students.

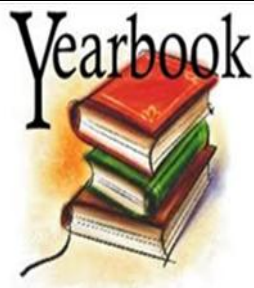
FFA Competitions and Leadership Development

The 35 high school FFA members have been busy this fall with land judging and leadership events. Kendrin Millage, Alex Nordstrom, Brady Appel and Gunnar Kangas participated in the Southeast Region Land Judging event on Sept. 30 with the team placing 19th. Lexi Klein and Lindsey Wolles attended the National FFA

Convention in Louisville, KY on Oct. 29-Nov. 1. The Jackrabbit Invitational Leadership event in Brookings on Nov. 6 gives members an opportunity to demonstrate their leadership skills in 5 individual events which include prepared public speaking, extemporaneous speaking, job interview, ag broadcasting and creed speaking. There are also 6 team events members can participate.

The FFA district leadership events will be held in Hartford on Nov. 17 in which members can compete in the same 5 individual and 6 team events with the top

two teams and the top three individuals advancing on to the state event in Pierre on Dec. 7 & 8. Members can also apply and interview to serve as one of the six district officers for the 2014-15 year.

Preparing students for success in postsecondary and the workforce

Have you heard about dual credit courses available to your high school student at a greatly reduced cost? Registration for the spring semester will start soon, so now is the time to discuss this great opportunities with your child. Dual credit courses can help high school students save time and money and get a jump start on their postsecondary education.

Dual credit courses allow high school students to enroll in a public postsecondary institution in South Dakota and simultaneously earn credit towards both their high school diploma and postsecondary degree or certificate. These courses are more affordable than ever before. Select dual credit coursework is available to students in grades 11-12 at the reduced rate of \$40 per credit. Compare that to what full-time college students pay—an average cost of more than \$200 per credit at South Dakota public universities and technical institutes—and you can see the savings potential is significant. These courses can also be a great way for students to “test the water” to better gauge whether or not they might enjoy a particular field of study. In order to qualify for acceptance into this program, juniors must be in the top third of their class or have scored in the 70th percentile on the ACT. Seniors must be in the top half of their class or have scored in the 50th percentile on the ACT.

Dual Credit at Reduced Cost

What is Dual Credit?

Dual credit is an opportunity for high school students to enroll in postsecondary institutions in South Dakota while earning credits for both their high school diploma and postsecondary degree or certificate at the same time.

What are the Benefits of Dual Credit?

Dual credit courses provide students with a number of benefits, including:

- A jump start to students' postsecondary careers.
- Significant cost savings for students and parents through reduced tuition costs.
- Increased confidence for college success.

What courses are available?

Students are able to take a number of on-campus and online courses offered by public postsecondary institutions in South Dakota, including general education and career and technical education courses.

How much do dual credit courses cost?

Select dual credit courses are available to high school students in grades 11-12 at the rate of \$40 per credit. Students are responsible for the cost of course credits and any required textbooks of related course materials.

How do I register?

Student should contact their high school counselor Mrs. Ruesink or Principal Mrs. Kludt to register.

Will these courses transfer?

Students are encouraged to check with their institution of choice regarding the transferability of credits earned.

Courses available through the South Dakota Board of Regents (SDBOR) institutions and centers will transfer between each of the six SDBOR institutions, including:

- Black Hills State University
- Dakota State University
- Northern State University
- South Dakota School of Mines & Technology
- South Dakota State University
- University of South Dakota

Courses available through South Dakota Technical Institutes may or may not transfer to other postsecondary institutions in South Dakota.

Technical Institutes include:

- Lake Area Technical Institute
- Mitchell Technical Institute
- Southeast Technical Institute
- Western Dakota Technical Institute

Admissions Criteria for Dual Credit Courses Spring 2015



1. High school junior eligible to enroll in high school in South Dakota; OR
 - a. Earn an ACT composite score of 24 reflective of the 70% percentile; or
 - b. Rank in the upper one-third of their graduating class; or
 - c. Earn a cumulative GPA of at least 3.50 on a 4.0 scale
2. High school senior eligible to enroll in a high school in South Dakota; OR
 - a. Earn an ACT composite score of 21 reflective of the 50% percentile; or
 - b. Earn in the upper one-half of their graduating class; or
 - c. Earn a cumulative GPA of at least 3.25 on a 4.0 scale
